Notes on search for family history in Scotland

Introduction

Several types of records can shed light on a family history, some more accessible or rich in information than others. The records which will yield most information most quickly are the Registers of Births, Marriages and Deaths and Old Parish Registers, which are kept in the Registrar's Office in Princes Street, Edinburgh (opposite the GPO). Other potentially useful records are the land registers which are kept in the building next down the Registrar's Office, or possibly the Scottish Railway Archives. Clearly, documents such as wills or land registers will be micher in biographical details than Birth, Marriage or Death Certificates, whereas the latter are more useful for establishing the major details such as dates, names of family members, and whereabouts.

Records held in the Registrar's Office (Registrar's General's Office)

From 1855 in Scotland, registration of Birth's, Marriages and Deaths was compulsory, and certificates were issued along the lines we know today. Before that time the Old Parish Records contain, to a greater or lesser extent similar details. Census's were held every 10 years from 1841and these can provide extremely useful information to help pinpoint the wherabouts of the family. In summary, the Office containw:

1. Census records from 1841-1891

2. Certificates of Birth's, Marriages and Deaths from 1855.

3. Old Parish Records up to about 1855.

4. Index of the script on the headstones in most of the Scottish Churchyards (provided by the Scottish Genealogical Society)

5. Alphabetical lists, year by year, of the certificates of Birth, Marriage and Death held by the office (known as the Indices).

The Indices of Births and Birth Certificates

If the year of birth is known this index will give the parish (very important) of birth and the number of the entry in the local register.

Knowing the parish and entry number, the actual certificate can be found very quickly (on request to the assistants knimmax in the office, who will look out the register from the archives at the back of the room).

The Birth Certificate itself will provide the following additional information: father's name

ation: father's name

mother's name (and maiden name)

date of marriage (not for a few years immediately after 1855)

address of birthplace
occupation of father

The Indices of Marriage and Marriage Certificates
Knowing the ***Expressive** Expressive** date of marriage (from the Birth Certificate of one of the Children) the Marriage Index will give the parish and entry number of the marriage in **the the local register.** The marriage certificate, very helpfully, gives the following: age of both parties

occupation of both parties
parents (both) of both parties (including the maiden
names of the mothers)
occupations (sometimes) of the fathers

knowing the age of the two parties their birth certificates can be found easily, as described above. Incidentally, in cases of doubt, a cross check can be made in the Index by looking separately for the name of the man (in the male index) and the woman(in the female index). Both Indices should refer to the same entry in the same local register.

The Indices of Death and Death Certificates

Deaths are indexed in exactly the same way as births and marriages.

Unfortunately, there is no easy way to know the year of death (kirthx (birth and marriage certificates do not contain such information) one tan tends not to know the day nor the hour !) This is a great pity as the Death Certificates somewimes contain much useful information:

date of death and cause (sometimes very detailed) place of death age at death(bless them, sometimes they lost count) whether the person was a widow or windower (this helps in the process of elimination to find the date of death of the other partner) marriage partner of the deceased (including maiden name) maiden name of the deceased (if female) parents of the deceased

The amount of information in the Death Certificates makes it worth the extra effort involved in looking up the indexes formexes several years when the approximate date of death is known.

Old Parish Records

The local ministers were obliged to make an entry for every birth marriage or death which came under their jurisdiction. However, some of them were not very reliable in doing this, and some of them had atrocious hand-writing, so there are a few gaps, fortunately not many. Werse than this, these documents are not indexed, so that a search in them requires painstaking scrutiny of every entry. It is clearly an advantage to know the approximate date of the entry one is looking for, and one can only hope that that the family did not move to or from an unknown parish during the period of interest. Clues as to parish of origin are given in the MAKINGE marriage entries (so-and-so of such-and-such a parish). The women in all cases are referred to by their maiden names. Unlike the later Death Certificates, the death entries contain little more than the cause of death.

Gravestones
The indices of gravestones can be used to correlate members of faities families, and may help to locate a family if it was suspected that they had moved.

Census records
These give much useful information, e.g.

occupants of a given address on the night of the census occupations of the occupants

Agenx ages

details of the accommodation (e.g. how many windows) acreage of frames farms

As these records are not indexed, it is again necessary to know the parish of the family sought for. The records can be very useful in finding who belongs to which family, and in finding details about brothers and sisters. Although they often had to guess at their ages, the census records **pxaxidaxinfaxxatian** give clues about dates of birth.

Access to the records
The following options are available:

1. Search inthe Indices and Certificates of Birth, Marriage and Death (currently £3 for one day)

2. As 1. plus access to the Census records and

Old Parish Registers (£3.50 perday).
Option 2 requires allocation of a seat in the library which are issued on a first-come-first-served basis. The rush starts at 9.30 a.m. when the doors open. It pays to payxfaxxaxxxxx take out a week's search which costs £8 if you think you will be there formore than two days in one week. Doing this will automatically entitle you to a seat in the library, and , of course, access to all the records. The Office is open from 9.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. on weekdays.

Family History Notes

The following are the notes obtained from Census Records, the General Registers, and Old Parish Registers of Scotland. The Search concentrated on the Nimmo's but a small amount of information was also obtained about the Williamsons. The notes here are as they were gleaned from the records with little attempt to coordinate the conclusions. In a few instances inform ations was obtained about branches of the family which have little direct relevance to the family line, but are included for the record. These red herrings occur from time to time during a search because it may not be clear whether the facts are relevant or not. Often, in any case, these red herrings shed light on family relationships.

Muiravonside John Nimmo and Helen Binnie are not recorded in this census. Helen Binnie (widow) died in Polmont

in this census. Helen Binnie (widow) died in Polmont in 1869. It is possible that John was already dead and that Helen was staying with her family elsewhere at the time of the census. A search for the death certificate of John after 1855 proved fruitless.

Notes to above conclusions

The evidence for the line back to John Nimmo and Helen Binnie is very conclusive. William Nimmo's death certificate confirms that his parents were John Nimmo and Helen Binnie. The parentage of John Nimmo, however is not so certain, but the following facts support the theory that his parents were Alexander Nimmo and Mary Brown:

1. He was born in Muiravonside (he later moved to Polmont, when he married Helen Binnie, and his first four children were born there. He moved back to Muiravonside btween the births of Thomas and Henry, between 1836 and 1841) Helen returned to Polmont again to die there in 1869). All this information can be established from the censuses of 1841-1861.

2. The census information suggests that he was born around 1800, but he was not too clear about his age as he put on 15 years between the 1841 and 1851 censuses. The only John Nimmo to be recorded in the Muiravonside Parish register around this time was born to Alexander Nimmo and Mary Brown in 1796.

3. His son Henry waxxeattexxxtxex Johnston may well have been called after grandwarker John's grandmother Isobel Johnston. (Against this, however, although he called his eldest son Alexander he may not have followed tradition for naming his subsequent children if his parents were indeed Alexander Nimmo and Mary Brown; axxx search for Helen Binniess parents would shed some light on this; one should expect them to be called Helen and John.).

It is quite possible that Alexander Nimmo, portioner, b.1771, d. 1858, was a farmer who split his farm, giving 50 acres to Alexander b. 1800. John, the eldest son got 50 acres when he returned to Muiravonside. In any case, we know from the census information that both John and Alexander were (the eldest and second sons of Alexander b. 1771) were both farmers, and it would be reasonable to assume that, if they had inherited their farms, the family had been tied to Muiravonside for some time. The line back to Alexander Nimmo and Christian Buchan follows fairly easily by checking all the entries in the Muiravonside Parish Register.

It is not easy to explain the date 1711 on the Muiravonside gravestone which names Alexander Nimmo and Christian Buchan and George Nimmo and Mary Dougal. Possibly it was erected in, say 1741, by Alex and Christian and the script was misread by the researcher. Alternatively, it was erected at some unknown date by Alex and Christian, and the date recorded was the date of death of the last to die, either George or Mary. Certainly it could hardly have been erected in 1711 by Alexander and Christian, as they did not marry until 1724. H it Perhaps the most likely explanation is that it was erected by George and Mary in 1711 and used later by Alexander and Christian. This is supported by the initials on the stone, but the order of the names would suggest that Alexander and Mary died first. A search of the death entries in the parish register would help to solve the mystery. A search of the birth entries should reveal whether or not George was the father of Alexander or whether they were brothers.

Suggestions for further research Who were Helen Binniess parents? (Helen was born in Polmont, so the answer should be found in the Polmont Parish Register around 1795) (Actually I've just noticed that I have here death certificate (see p5.) and this confirms that her parents were, indeed, called Helen and John. It looks as though theyfollowed the tradition of maxing naming their children after all, i.e. the first son after John's father, Alexander, the second after Helen's father, John, the first daughter after Helen's mother, Helen, and the second daughter after John's mother, Mary. The third son and daughter would have been John and Helen after the parents, but they already had one each of those, so presumably the later children were named after aunts and uncles. (Except dear little Henry, of course, who was called after his great grandmother as well). This, of course, comfirms that John's parents were Alexander and Mary Brown). 2. What are the missing dates? Can some of those death certificates be found? (e.g. John Nimmo', Helen Binnie's husband, who died somewhere between 1851 (the census) and 1869 (Helen's death, she was a widow).

- Can some of the details of the brothers and sisters be filled out?
- Who were the parents of the wives?
- 5. Was Walter Scott related to Sir Walter Scott? (my encyclopedia says that Sir Walter Scott was born in 1771, so was the father of the bastard here thexistes also the father of Sir Walter?)
- Were the parents of Alexander Nimmo, George Nimmo and Mary Dougal?
- Does the land register have anything to day about the farms mbelonging ot the Nimmo family? Do any wills exist which will add some biographical details and shed some light on the faminly
- 8. How could we establish where the family immigrated from?
 9. What does the Williamson/Walker family tree look like?
 10. Can all the Alexander Nimmos and their various wives Mary be sorted out? Did any of them marky twice?
